CHALLENGES: COMMEMORATION & CHANGE CELEBRATION,

"We are small but mighty" is an apt descriptor of the Raoul Wallenberg Committee of the United States.

These five words, coined by President Diane Blake, capture the Committee's spirited thirty - two year history. Yet, never did they ring more true than when overcoming the challenges faced during the past three years.

Celebration & Commemoration: The Committee, poised to celebrate its 30th Anniversary in 2011 and the Centenary of Raoul Wallenberg's birth in 2012, encountered

economic uncertainty, mirroring that confronting organizations nationwide. The Committee's very existence was in peril.

The necessities and rigors of relocating our offices in 2011 and again in 2013 compounded the other challenges we faced.

Characteristically, the Committee responded with spirited determination setting a new goal of renewal and revitalization.

Change: Under the keen leadership of Chairman Rachel Oestreicher Bernheim, President Blake, the Board of Directors, and the dedicated Staff, the Committee maintained its Mission (see page 2) while adjusting course and changing locations.

First, the Committee regained independence in 2011 by ending an affiliation with another not-for -profit organization.

Second, The Honorable David Dangoor, Swedish Honorary Consul General to New York, arranged for the Committee to

move to The Center for Jewish History in Manhattan in 2011.

Two years later, in 2013, circumstances changed — so did our location - to 37 West 26th Street in the heart of New York's historic Chelsea/Flatiron District.

Third, the Committee's dedicated Board welcomed new Directors: Bonnie Kaye and Noah D. Genel, Esq. Cynthia Green Colin, Flora Major, and Hon. David Dangoor, returned to The Board.

Fourth, essential lifelines of support have been cast to the Committee by The Fridolin Foundation, The Bernheim Foundation and, of course, the ongoing generosity of Members and Friends.

After 32 years, we are asking the same question. We look back with astonishment, with very limited financial resources, a small dedicated staff, and a supportive Board of Direc-

tors—we have accomplished Herculean tasks. We raised the consciousness of the general public and both American and Swedish government officials to the point where the case of Raoul Wallenberg could no longer be ignored. Sweden has finally started to pay full tribute to its most heroic native son. The year 2012

was declared the *Raoul Wallenberg Centenary*. At last, the world is taking notice.

In 1990, the Committee assessed how to honor Raoul Wallenberg. A STUDY OF HEROES is our living monument to Raoul Wallenberg. It was developed to pass forward the character traits and values of this most heroic of men. It is based on our belief...that the heroes of a nation reflect the values of its people. Today, HEROES is recognized as an exemplary character education, social studies, and literacy program. It has reached well over two million students in a multiplicity of educational settings (K - 12 and Adults) that include schools both nationwide and abroad. The positive measurable results achieved in schools have been equally matched by the use of HE-ROES in adult and juvenile correctional facilities.

Regardless of demographics, educators, counselors, librarians, social workers, parents and students credit HEROES with developing academic skills; building good character; counteracting patterns of violence; and helping to restore *hope*.

So, "How do we measure success?"

Not by our bottom line, but by the extraordinary number of lives we have touched, and by the positive difference we have made and are continuing to make! There are growing numbers of people of every age whose lives have been changed by Raoul Wallenberg.



ABOUT THE RAOUL WALLENBERG COMMITTEE

The Raoul Wallenberg Committee of the United States was created as a not-for-profit corporation in 1981. Its mission is:

To perpetuate, through A STUDY OF HEROES, the humanitarian ideals and nonviolent courage of Raoul Wallenberg, a 31 year-old Christian Swede, who at the behest of the United States government at the end of World War II went to Budapest, Hungary and without resorting to violence saved from the Nazis more than 100,000 Jews in six months time. For still unknown reasons, Wallenberg was arrested by the Soviets in 1945; was imprisoned and thrown into The Gulag; and has never been seen as a free man again.

(By a Joint Act of Congress in 1981, Wallenberg was made the Third Honorary Citizen of the United States.)

- To seek the truth surrounding the mystery of the fate of Raoul Wallenberg through THE NO STONE UN-TURNED (STONES) Program;
- To maintain archives and to provide information and expert services to researchers, the media, individuals, organizations, and governments inquiring about the story of Raoul Wallenberg; and

Award on individuals, organizations, and communities reflecting the values, spirit and courage of Raoul Wallenberg.

Following Professor Braham, Rachel Bernheim spoke eloquently of Wallenberg's innate compassion, conviction, and heroic character. She wove spellbinding stories about Raoul's transformative life experiences preparing and motivating him to make a difference in the lives of others. Such gripping stories were often rooted in firsthand accounts shared personally with Rachel by those whose lives had beem saved by The audience was visibly moved. Some were Holocaust survivors. Others had friends and relatives saved by Wallenberg. Still others came to learn more about Wallenberg or to become acquainted with him for the first time.

Picking up the Wallenberg story where Rachel left off, Diane chronicled, with detailed research, the period following Raoul's capture by the Soviet troops on January 17, 1945. Through research and personal anecdotes, Diane painted a compelling yet frustrating picture of the efforts to free Wallenberg — one that for sixtyseven years has been fraught with combined good intentions, perseverance, and dedication; diplomatic and investigative steps and missteps; hints and hopes; lies, misrepresentations and, all too often, deadends and disregard.

President Blake, who directs the No Stone Unturned (STONES) Program at The Raoul Wallenberg Committee of the United States, continues in her search for the Truth about the fate of Raoul Wallenberg and in her commitment to ensure that is ultimately brought home to Sweden and to his Family.

The evening concluded with a vigorous Q & A session followed by a resounding standing ovation for Rachel and Diane.

From the President's Desk ...

This is the year of Raoul Wallenberg's 102nd birthday. He is an honorary citizen of four countries. There have been stamps issued in his honor; schools, parks, and streets named for him; statues and monuments erected; and even an orchid created in his name. Sweden designated 2012 as the official "Raoul Wallenberg Year". Yet, Raoul Wallenberg deserves more than honors. He deserves the truth of his fate to finally be made public, and he deserves to come home.

In the past several years, new information has been found which shows that Raoul Wallenberg was called in for interrogation on July 23, 1947 — six days after his supposed death date. Also found is new material from Willy Roedel, Raoul's cellmate in Lubianka Prison. The Russians have claimed for years that this information no longer existed. This is the clearest sign yet that the Russian archives still contain critically important documents about the Wallenberg

What is needed now is a high level request from the Swedish government for the truth. A little help from the United States government wouldn't hurt either. The time of doubt as to whether the materials still exist and whether the Raoul Wallenberg case can be solved is past. This new information wipes away all doubts.

Raoul Wallenberg was Prisoner #7 "The archivists added that 'Prisoner No. 7' had been interrogated on July 23rd, 1947 which—if confirmed— would mean that the Soviet era claims of Wallenberg's death on July 17, 1947 are no longer valid. Never before have Russian officials stated the possibility of Raoul Wallenberg's survival past this date so explicitly."

MARGIT DEMENY: A LIFE TOUCHED BY WALLENBERG

'Each human being is special, but Margit Kelemen Demeny was more actively special than most ..."

 August 4, 2013, Manhattan; Eulogy for Dr. Demeny, a long-time friend of the Raoul Wallenberg Committee of the United States. By fate, Margit was laid to rest on the 101st anniversary of Raoul Wallenberg's birth.

Margit inspired all whom she met — speaking at schools; educating groups about the Holocaust; sharing wisdom and the Wallenberg Story with students, researchers, and writers.

Born in Baja, Hungary, in 1914, Margit, after

her Father's death in 1923, moved with her Mother and Sister to Budapest. There, she excelled in both athletics and academics.

Only illness prevented her from accepting an invitation to join Hungary's National Gymnastics Team. Having earned her PhD in Physical Chemistry in 1943, Margit married in 1944. Within a

year, Margit's husband was killed on a death march. Margit survived the horrors

of Nazi-occupied Hungary by moving into a Wallenberg Safe House in 1944.

Margit remarried in 1947 and settled in New York working as a researcher and faculty member at Mt. Sinai Hospital and NYU Medical Center, retiring in 1982. Margit continued to devote her tireless and selfless energy

to her loving Family. She is very much missed.

A framed certificate from the United States Department of State paying tribute to Raoul Wallenberg as *A Person of Courage* is proudly displayed at the Raoul Wallenberg Committee's new office. This award honors the humanitarian values and heroic courage of Wallenberg.

The certificate reminds all of Raoul's commitment to act on principle in times of crisis and of the Committee's dedication, through its NO STONE UNTURNED and HEROES Programs, to keep Raoul's legacy alive as an inspiration for generations to come.

The 'Person of Courage' Tribute was presented in Washington, DC on April 6th, 2011 at an event commemorating the 60th Anniversary of the 1951 Refugee Convention, an international agreement defining the legal obligations of nations to protect refugees.

She has served as a consultant on books, films and documentaries about the life of Raoul Wallenberg. Rachel is listed in The Foremost Women in the Twentieth Century and Who's Who of American Women. Rachel is the recipient of Salem Academy's 2011 Distinguished Alumni Award. She has served on the Boards of Salon de Virtuosi and Givat Haviva Educational Institute. HEROES AUTHOR SERVES COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY'S TEACHERS COLLEGE ALUMNI COUNCIL

Tempus fugit ... again, of course. After six years of service, Dr. Kathleen Morin completed her second term as a Member of Columbia University's Teachers College Alumni Council in 2012. She served on its Executive Committee and as Co-Chair of its Programs & Resources Committee.

Kathy has been associated with The Raoul Wallenberg Committee since 1990, first pro bono, then as a Consultant and for the past fifteen years as its Director of Education. Prior, she earned a doctorate and two masters from Teachers College and served as an Instructor; Associate Director of the Preservice Program; Honorary Assistant Professor; and Research Associate In the Institute of Philosophy and Politics. In 2005, she received the Teachers College Distinguished Alumni Award. In 2008, Kathy was the Curriculum Consultant to TC's project Teaching The Levees for Spike Lee's HBO documentary When The Levees Broke: A Requiem In Four Acts.

Kathy, who taught in settings ranging from Appalachia to Spanish Harlem, first came to the Committee when Rachel Oestreicher Bernheim contacted TC's President's Office and Curriculum Department seeking someone with whom she could work in developing an educational program that she had conceptualized. Rachel's idea was to create an interdisciplinary curriculum as a living monument to the humanitarian values and nonviolent heroism of Raoul Wallenberg.

In the 1990s, Rachel and Kathy collaborated with a network of pilot schools (public, independent, and faith-based in urban, inner-city, suburban, and rural settings) in North Carolina and the New York Metropolitan Area.

The Result: A STUDY OF HE-ROES (K-12, and Adults) which today has reached

2,000,000 students nationally and internationally in such diverse venues as: schools, libraries, community-based organizations; gifted, special education, ESL, foster-care, home-schooling, after-school, and adult education programs; a residential school for the profoundly deaf; The Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Washington; rehabilitative and preventative programs for juvenile offenders and at-risk populations; and in adult prisons and correctional facilities for character education and GED preparation.




